## Troop #20697 Recipe for Pet Treats

1 ½ cup Rolled Oats  
¼ cup vegetable oil  
½ cup flour  
½ cup either chicken or beef bouillon

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Mix all ingredients into dough. Dust hands with flour and form round biscuits, size will vary depending on animal. Cat treats should be Pea sized and dog treats should be meatball sized. Bake 20 - 30 minutes depending on size or until biscuits are slightly browned.
